
SAC Meeting

First place teams in each problem and division are invited to attend the World Finals in the United States. The season will begin in October.

It is a program for middle school and high school students. Students will plan, organize, design, promote, and sell the upcoming school yearbook. A web-based platform will be used to create the yearbook pages and students are primarily responsible for taking the pictures that will end up in the yearbook. It is advised for the parents to know the names of the teachers they would like to see, to avoid waiting in line for a copy of a student's schedule.


Parents are asked to limit each conference to five minutes and are encouraged to make an appointment if more time is necessary.





Guide for Parents

FINE ARTS IN DoDDS EUROPE

Experience in the creative process is essential for all learners. In the arts, this process involves solving problems with skill and imagination, discovering new questions, producing new ideas and objects, or interpretations of existing works. Learning in, about, and through the arts develops each learner's capacity to make meaning from experience, respond to creativity, and contribute to society. DoDDS-Europe is dedicated to offering a variety of state-level student music, art, and drama activities. These activities are designed to move the student beyond the classroom and challenge them to expand their skills. The following is a listing and description of the major Fine Arts activities sponsored by DoDDS-Europe.

CREATIVE CONNECTIONS

Ten classes in the visual and performing arts are offered to 150 students for a period of 5 days. Classes may include, but are not limited to, such diverse subjects as Drawing, Oil Pastel Painting, Sculpture, Modern Dance, Strings, Drama, Strings, Video Productions, and Show Choir. Experts in the field teach the classes. Students may apply for this activity in November 2008 through their schools. A committee of 7 arts educators meets in December to make the selections. DoDDS-Europe covers the cost of transportation while the student pays a registration fee (approximately 200.00 Euro) for lodging and meals. The fee will vary according to exchange rates.



DRAMA FESTIVAL

Drama Festival features drama students presenting scenes, in a variety of categories, from various productions. Workshops in aspects of drama productions are also part of the festival activities. Students participate as teams from their local schools. Students pay a registration fee of approximately \$200.00 for lodging and meals. For more information, students should contact the local Drama Teacher.

JAZZ SEMINAR

This big band swing style seminar incorporates 28 student instrumentalists and 6-8 vocal soloists who focus on the study of jazz. The students, under the direction of major jazz musicians/educators, have the opportunity to listen, read, perform, and improvise jazz music. The culminating activity for the seminar is a series of jazz concerts presented by the students for the local community and schools. The activity is usually held in January with the site rotating to locations throughout Europe each year. Application information is sent to high schools in September. A committee of music educators selects participants through a recorded audition. DoDDS-Europe covers the cost of transportation and instructors while the students pay a registration fee (approximately 275.00 Euro) for lodging and meals. The fee will vary according to seminar location and exchange rates.

Fine Arts Guide for Parents

HONORS MUSIC FESTIVAL

The Honors Music program offers 60 student instrumentalists and 80 vocalists the opportunity to gather together for 5 days to study a variety of band and choral music. After a period of intensive rehearsals conducted by two of America's finest conductors, the students present a concert with a combined band and choral finale. The concert is performed in the major European concert hall in Germany. The large audience consists of Americans and Germans from the local communities. Students apply through their local high school by submitting a recorded audition. A committee composed of music teachers from DoDDS-Europe schools selects participants. DoDDS-Europe covers the cost of transportation and supplies. Students pay a registration fee (approximately 200.00 Euro) for lodging and meals. The fee will vary according to exchange rates.



SHOWCASE ANTHOLOGY

SHOWCASE is an anthology of original art and literature submitted by DoDDS-Europe students from pre-school through grade 12. From the beginning of the school year teachers collect student works to be submitted to their District Superintendent Office Screening Committee, which meets in early April. The committees screen over 4,000 student submis-



sions to determine the most worthy and publishable works to be submitted to the SHOWCASE Production Board. In March the Production Board, composed of representative art and literature teachers from each district, selects the student works to be included in the anthology and prepares the publication for printing. The final printing is accomplished in May followed by distribution to the schools and communities by June. Interested students should consult with their local art and literature teachers regarding the process for submitting their work for publication.

MEMORANDUM FOR PARENTS/STAFF

SUBJECT: Annual Notification of Asbestos Containing Materials

The Department of Defense Dependents Schools (DoDDS) has established an Asbestos Management Program at all schools in compliance with the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), which was enacted by Congress in 1986, and for which the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) issued regulations in 1987.

As an initial phase of the Asbestos Management Program, DoDDS conducted detailed surveys of all school facilities to identify asbestos containing materials. The initial surveys of DoDDS schools in Europe were conducted in 1988. Re-surveys are conducted every three years to identify any change in the condition of the asbestos containing materials. Re-surveys were conducted in 1991, 1994 and 1997. EPA certified engineering firms under contract to DoDDS conducted all surveys. Asbestos containing materials identified in the schools were classified in accordance with EPA Assessment Categories. Copies of all surveys conducted in a school are available from the school's Asbestos Coordinator, Mr. Doug McEnery, DGF Schools, Rota, Spain. The Asbestos Coordinator acts as the point of contact for inquiries pertaining to asbestos in their school and will permit any interested member of the public to review these asbestos surveys.

Nearly all schools in Europe contain some asbestos containing materials. The most common form of asbestos containing material found in DGF Schools, NAVSTA Rota, Spain, is vinyl asbestos floor tile and some outdoor overhead walkway roofing canopies. These and most of the other forms of asbestos containing material identified in DoDDS schools are non-friable materials, in good condition and pose no danger to students or staff unless disturbed by improper maintenance and repair. Special Operations and Maintenance Programs were developed for each school to ensure that any asbestos containing materials were not disturbed during maintenance and repair work.

Asbestos containing materials poses a health hazard only when it is friable or damaged and releases asbestos fibers into the air where they can be inhaled. Asbestos containing materials, which were classified in accordance with EPA regulations as friable or damaged to the degree that asbestos fibers could be released, were identified for prompt abatement. Abatement is accomplished in accordance with EPA regulations by removal, repair or encapsulation of the asbestos containing materials. Abatement projects have been completed in all cases where the asbestos containing materials were considered to pose a danger to students or staff. Specific asbestos abatement projects have also been designed and are being executed to remove asbestos containing materials in areas where they must be removed to permit school renovation projects to proceed.

All DoDDS asbestos abatement projects are executed by specially certified asbestos contractors and are monitored by EPA certified inspectors. At the completion of asbestos abatement projects, air samples are taken by these inspectors and tested by a certified laboratory. No school facility in which asbestos has been abated is returned for use until the final air clearance has verified that it is free of asbestos fibers in accordance with EPA requirements.

Parent Newsletter Article for November 2008

November is a significant month as DoDDS-E celebrates American Education Week and begins administering the biannual DoDEA Customer Satisfaction Survey. This survey provides valuable feedback from students and parents about the quality of education your child is receiving.

This year's survey represents a departure from tradition in that the survey will be administered to students in grades 4-12 and parents or sponsors for each child enrolled in DoDDS-Europe schools from Pre-kindergarten/SureStart through the 12th grade. As with prior Customer Satisfaction Surveys, participation remains voluntary (but highly encouraged). Administrators, teachers, and educational support staff will participate in a separate survey in a few months.

The surveys were developed through a review process of various groups, including teachers' unions, Teachers of the Year, superintendents, principals, students and the Education Directorate staff members at the DoDEA headquarters. Some questions were adapted from the *Phi Delta Kappa Gallup Poll of Public's Attitudes Toward Schools*. The 2008 CSS contains more parent/student specific questions, particularly with regard to guidance and counseling.

The survey is available November 1, 2008 through February 28, 2009, and takes approximately 20 minutes to complete. It is available online at www.dodea.edu (click on the CSS graphic link). Parents who do not have access to the Internet should contact their child's school to determine other alternatives, such as using the school's computers or receiving a paper copy that can be mailed to DoDEA headquarters.

Information derived from the surveys will be used to improve planning efforts at all levels throughout DoDEA. Schools, districts, and area offices will use the survey results to gain insight into the satisfaction levels of sponsors and students which is one of many measures used for future planning of programs and services DoDDS-Europe and our DoDEA headquarters offers.

The results of the survey have a significant impact on the educational programs your child receives in DoD schools. I strongly encourage everyone to spend 20 minutes on this worthwhile project.

American Education Week 2008 is scheduled for November 16–22, 2008. The theme this year is *Great Public Schools: A Basic Right and Our Responsibility*. The annual American Education Week (AEW) spotlights the importance of providing every child in America with a quality public education from kindergarten through college, and the need for everyone to do his or her part in making public schools great. Please contact your school for more information regarding American Education Week activities.
